

SYSCO Fleets and Racing Options

SYSCO offers a variety of racing options on the Columbia River. There are several One-Design classes (see fleets below) as well as ORC/PHRF (performance handicap racing fleets) classes that offer exciting racing opportunities. If you would prefer not to fly a spinnaker, there is a Cruising Fleet where registrants are divided into several classes (e.g., Cruising A, Cruising B, etc) based on relevant factors such as ratings for the type of boat, the observed performance of local boats, and the number of registrants.

Three or more boats of the same model can race as a One-Design Fleet. SYSCO currently has nine one-design fleets. Skippers can request to race boat-to-boat in Level Fleets that are formed based on the factors described above. This option is especially useful for racers that want to fly a spinnaker and do not have an ORC or PHRF-NW Rating Certificate.

Members of SYSCO are also members of local Fleets. Fleets are an important part of SYSCO and are responsible for serving as the Race Committee on their assigned dates. The current fleet list as of publication is:

Only one sail may be used forward of the main mast on Sloops, and on Cutters, Yawls, and Ketches unless the yacht is specifically rated for carrying additional sails. The boat can only be entered in one class for a Series, and the barbecue must be mounted and ready to cook or cooking.





Offshore Racing Congress (ORC) Handicap Racing

Why did it start? The ORC was founded in 1969 by the Royal Ocean Racing Club (RORC) and the Cruising Club of America (CCA) to develop a handicap standard for the international community. The ORC Rule was structured in the late 2000s to promote safe design practices and to fairly rate a broad range of designs, including cruiser/racer and modern race boats.

How it works. The ORC Rule relies on a Velocity Prediction Program (VPP) based on standard measurements defined by the Universal Measurement System (UMS). The rating calculator outputs a multi-number rating, suitable for various scoring options and course configurations. The ORC VPP is updated annually and all rules, regulations, certificates and VPP documentation are freely available to the racing community. ORC scoring options including Time-on-Distance, Time-on-Time, Triple Number, and Performance Curve Scoring.

Who uses it? ORC is globally recognized in local, national, and international races, making it the most popular measurement-based rating system in the world. It is used, and growing, in numerous regions around the US. The Pacific NW Offshore is solely using ORC ratings in 2025, with growing use in races such as Swiftsure, Van Isle 360, and Race Week Bellingham. Locally, the ORC fleet continues to grow as an accurate, and competitive option for non-one-design or level fleet boats.



Sea Scouts

The Sea Scouts were established in the US in 1912 to prepare young men for service in the Navy. Today, Sea Scouts is a young-adult oriented program open to men and women between 14 and 18. Sea Scouts is experiential learning with lots of fun, hands-on activities. Programs offer leadership, fitness, outdoor activities, community service, social interaction, and career-building skills.

Sea Scout units are called "ships," even though they might not actually meet and train aboard their vessel. There are active Sea Scout Ships throughout the country, though most are concentrated in metropolitan areas near the coastline. Sea Scout Ship 601, "City of Roses" is one of the oldest Sea Scout Ships in the Nation. Based in Portland, the unit, active since 1929, was originally "Viking" and changed to "City of Roses" in 1939 to honor the ship's home port.

The Ship has two training vessels. The 29-foot ketch-rigged Cascade sailboat named "City of Roses", built from a kit by unit members in 1973, has no engine and must be sailed or rowed by pulling four 13 foot oars. The other training vessel is a former US Coast Guard 44 foot motor lifeboat acquired in 1998. Though in need of major mechanical repairs, including a complete rebuild of one engine, the boat was made operational by unit members in 1999 and has been used ever since for underway training.

Ship 601 tries to get a boat underway at least 4 times a month. In addition to underway training, the unit participates in training with the USCG that has included incident preparedness, damage control, cold water survival, and the use of pyrotechnics. Meetings are run by the crew with guidance from the adults. Most of the vessel maintenance is done by the crew with the exception of those too dangerous for them to perform; truly a hands-on program.

The ship meets at Oregon Tackle Marina, 707 N. Hayden Island Dr. In the marina are ships BEAVER and VOYAGEUR. For info or to join contact:

Willamette Sailing Club (WSC) offers the only junior racing program in the Portland area, with around 80 sailors from ages 7-18. The WSC Junior Race Program offers local youth a chance to improve their sailing, racing, and teamwork skills under the guidance of expert coaches. In addition to weekday practices on the Willamette River, kids have an opportunity to compete against other junior sailors in venues throughout the Northwest and Pacific Coast at weekend regattas. Parents share in the volunteer duties at weekend regattas.

Willamette Sailing Club provides boats and US Sailing certified coaching staff. Sailors aged 7-12 practice and compete in single-handed Optimists. High School aged sailors practice and compete in single-handed Lasers or double-handed Club 420s. High school-aged sailors with extensive racing experience are also eligible to practice and compete with the trapeze and spinnaker 420's. Previous sailing experience is not required, but participants must be able to swim, commit to regular practices, and provide their own life jackets and cold-weather clothing.

The Spring season is February through May for High School Sailing and March through May for Optimist Race and Green Teams. The summer season is June, July, and August. The fall season is September through November. Depending on the program, practices are two or three days a week after school at Willamette Sailing Club.










Courses will be displayed on the committee boat by listing a Course Description for each class. Each Course Description shall be constructed in accordance with the OCSA General Sailing Instructions in the Racebook.

Do not cross the finish line during the race unless you are: (a) finishing the race, or (b) rounding the mark end of the finishing line when such a rounding is required by the course for your class.

The information contained on this page is intended to clarify and not alter the OCSA General Sailing Instructions in the Racebook.

A temporary yellow/orange inflatable mark or OCSA designated navigation buoy "2"

2 - Gybe Mark:

A temporary yellow/orange inflatable mark

3 - Short Course Leeward Rounding Mark: A temporary yellow/orange inflatable mark

4 - Long Course Leeward Rounding Mark: A temporary yellow/orange inflatable mark

5 - Leeward Rounding Mark:

Approximately 50 yards to weather of the Race Committee Boat - A temporary yellow/ orange inflatable mark

S - Starting Mark:

A temporary green inflatable mark

F - Finishing Mark:

A temporary yellow/orange inflatable mark or OCSA designated Navigation Buoy "14"

The diagram shows the marks of the course.

The Race Committee may or may not use all of these marks. However, mark 4 will not be used unless mark 3 is also set. The order in which the marks are to be passed is determined by the courses listed on the Alphabetic Table of Courses. A red square when displayed at the top of the course board signals that OCSA Designated Mark "2" shall serve as Mark 1. These courses are to be sailed with all marks

left to port. Courses will be displayed on committee boat by listing the class followed by the letter(s) from the Alphabetic Table of Courses. The start and finish lines may be on either side the committee boat. The finish line is restricted. Do not cross the finish line during the race unless you are finishing the race. This information is intended to clarify and is not intended to alter the OCSA GSI's.



OCSA General Sailing Instructions



1. RULES

- 1.1) The events will be governed by the rules as defined in *The Racing Rules of Sailing*.
- 1.2) Rules V1 & V2 of Appendix V And Appendix T will apply.
- **1.3)** [DP] The US Sailing Safety Equipment Requirements for the Category "Nearshore" will apply. www.ussailing.org/wp-content/uploads/2021/02/Monohull-SER-2021.0.pdf
- **1.4)** [DP] The OCSA COVID-19 Special Regulations will apply and will be updated as needed to comply with state and county requirements. www.sailpdx.org/wp-content/uploads/2021/02/2021COVID-19-Special-Regulations.pdf2.

2. CHANGES TO SAILING INSTRUCTIONS

2.1) Any change to the Sailing Instructions will be posted on the Official Notice Board by 2200 local time on the day before it will take effect.

3. COMMUNICATIONS WITH COMPETITORS

- **3.1)** Notices to competitors will be posted on the Official Notice Board located at www.sailpdx.org.
- **3.2)** [DP] Except in an emergency, a boat that is racing shall not make voice or data transmissions and shall not receive voice or data communication that is not available to all boats.
- **3.3)** The Race Committee may report visual signals and other information via VHF channel 72. This information is provided as a courtesy and does not in any way alter a boat's responsibility to observe the visual race signals that govern the conduct of the race. Errors or omissions resulting from such courtesy broadcasts will not be grounds for redress. This changes RRS 62.1(a).

4. CODE OF CONDUCT

4.1) [DP] Competitors and support persons shall comply with reasonable requests from race officials.

5. SCHEDULE OF RACES

5.1) The dates of racing, number of races, and scheduled time of the warning signal for the first race each day will be provided by the Organizing Authority and published in the Event Notice of Race.

6. CLASS FLAGS

6.1) Class Divisions and Class Flags, if any, will be provided by the Organizing Authority for the Event and will be posted on the Official Notice Board by 2200 local time on the day before it will take effect.

7. RACING AREAS

7.1) Buoy races will be in the area between the I-5 and I-205 bridges. Distance races will have the racing area defined by the Organizing Authority in the Event Notice of Race.

8. THE COURSES

- **8.1)** Courses will be designated by letter or by course description listing marks individually. Mark descriptions and locations for individually listed Designated Marks are provided in the "OCSA Designated Mark Chart" and for letter-designated courses in the "OCSA Windward Leeward Alphabetic Courses".
- **8.2)** A red square displayed at the top of the course board signals that, for all

Windward Leeward Alphabetic Courses, OCSA Designated Mark "2" will serve as Mark 1 of the "Alphabetic Courses".

- **8.3)** For course descriptions listing OCSA Designated Marks (DM), SF, S and/or F, the first letter/ number displayed is the starting mark, the last is the finishing mark, and those in between are the rounding marks.
- **8.4)** Boats must pass each rounding mark in the order designated leaving each rounding mark to port.
- **8.5)** For the Windward Leeward Alphabetical Courses, mark 4 will not be used unless mark 3 is also used.

9. MARKS

- **9.1)** Marks are as described in the "OCSA Windward Leeward Alphabetic Courses" or in the "OCSA Designated Mark Chart".
- 9.2) Starting & Finishing Marks
 - <DM> the Start and/or Finish is between the OCSA designated mark and the Signal Vessel.
 - "SF" the Start and Finish are the same. Start and finish between an inflatable mark and the Signal Vessel.
 - "S" the Start is between a GREEN inflatable mark and the Signal Vessel.
 - "F" the Finish is between an inflatable mark opposite of the start mark and the Signal Vessel.

10. OBSTRUCTIONS

- **10.1)** [DP] The following areas and lines are designated as obstructions:
 - 10.1.1) The area between McCuddy's Moorage and the 42nd Street boat ramp is restricted. A boat shall not sail inside the boundaries that are between the lighted day mark "2" at McCuddy's Moorage and the end of the breakwater at the 42nd Street boat ramp, and inside the county marker buoys which designate the restricted area. In the absence of county marker buoys, boats shall not sail within 150 feet of the moorages or launch area. County marker buoys upriver or downriver of the restricted area do not designate an area restricted to racing.
 - **10.1.2)** All boats shall pass on the channel side of any piling, buoy marking a missing piling, and log rafts or barges secured to a piling.
 - 10.1.3) After starting, a boat shall not cross the line between the signal vessel and the finishing mark unless she is: (a) finishing, or (b) rounding the mark end of the finishing line when such a rounding is required by the course for her class. A boat that fails to exonerate herself will be scored NSC.
- **10.2)** Infractions of Sailing Instructions 10.1.1, 10.1.2 & 10.1.3 are subject to the same hearing request & exoneration provisions as an infraction under Part 2 of the RRS.

11. THE START

11.1) When a plus sign ("+") is displayed between two or more classes, those classes will start together at the same time. The starting order for subsequent races may be different than the starting order for the first race. Classes may be started in any order.

OCSA General Sailing Instructions



- **11.2)** The starting line will be between a staff displaying an orange flag on the Signal Vessel and the course side of the starting mark.
- 11.3) If any part of a boat's hull is on the course side of the starting line at her starting signal and she is identified, the Race Committee will attempt to hail her sail number. Failure to hail her number, failure of her to hear such a hail, or the order in which boats are hailed shall not be grounds for a redress for request. This changes RRS 62.1(a).
- **11.4)** In the event of a General Recall(s), the warning signal for the recalled class(es) will be made after other races have started. The First Substitute will be removed with the Preparatory flag one minute before the start of the following class. This changes RRS 29.2.
- **11.5)** [DP] The starting area extends 150 feet on both sides of the starting line and in a 150-foot radius from both ends of the starting line. Boats whose warning signal has not been made shall avoid the starting area during the starting sequence for other races.
- **11.6)** A boat that has not started, whether or not racing, may use propulsion without penalty as long as the boat does not start for at least 4 minutes after discontinuing propulsion. This modifies RRS 42.
- **11.7**) A boat that makes contact with a Race Committee vessel will be scored DSQ without a hearing. This changes RRS 63.1 and Appendix A5.
- **11.8**) If the Race Committee intends to start another race on the same day, it may display the Second Substitute (with no sound) while boats are finishing.

12. THE FINISH

- **12.1)** The finishing line will be between a staff displaying an orange flag on the Signal Vessel and the course side of the finishing mark. This changes RRS Race Signals "Blue flag."
- **12.2)** A boat that is delaying the start of the next race may be awarded her place by the Race Committee without finishing. This changes RRS 28.

13. TIME LIMITS

- **13.1)** Except for distance races, the first boat in each class must finish within 2 hours of her starting signal. All other boats must finish within 30 minutes of the first boat in her class or they will be scored Time Limit Expired (TLE). This changes RRS 35, and Appendix A5 and A10.
- **13.2)** For distance races, the time limit will be provided by the Organizing Authority and published in the Event Notice of Race.

14. HEARING REQUESTS

- **14.1)** A boat intending to file a hearing request shall notify the Race Committee by hail or on VHF channel 72 immediately after finishing and before leaving the racing area unless she is unable to do so.
- **14.2)** Hearing requests must be submitted online at sailpdx.org/racing/race-hearings/ or emailed to the Hearing Request Committee at hearing.request@sailocsa.org no later than 2359 local time on the day of the race.
- **14.3)** The schedule of hearings will be posted on the Official Notice Board after the hearing request time limit, together with a document file for each hearing request filed. These postings shall constitute notice given and the



OCSA General Sailing Instructions

hearing request or redress information as required by RRS 63.2. Hearings will proceed whether or not all boats are represented.

14.4) Hearing requesting parties may be offered the opportunity to participate in voluntary hearing request mediation; Appendix T of the RRS.

15. SCORING

- **15.1)** Races for PHRF Classes will be scored using PHRF Time-on-Time ratings. Level and One-Design Classes shall be scored by the order of finish.
- **15.2)** One race will constitute a series.
- **15.3)** A score of TLE will be the number of finishers plus one. This changes RRS Appendix A5 & A10.
- **15.4)** When fewer than 5 races have been completed, a boat's series score will be the total of her race scores.
- **15.5)** When 5 or more races are completed, a boat's series score will be the total of her race scores excluding one of her worst scores for every 5 races that are completed.

16. SAFETY REGULATIONS

- **16.1)** [DP] Boats shall not impede the passage of a stand-on vessel and shall comply with the <u>U.S. Inland Navigation Rules Act of 1980</u>. Boats that fail to comply promptly with signals from a race official to alter course, or that receive a 5 blast warning (5 short sounds) from a stand-on vessel, will be subject to hearing request and possible disqualification. A boat in a position where she may interfere with a stand-on vessel shall clear the danger area immediately, and may use propulsion if necessary to do so, provided she does not improve her competitive position. This changes RRS 42.
- **16.2)** [DP] A boat that leaves the racing area before finishing or before the last race of the day shall, if possible, notify the Race Committee in person or via VHF channel 72 and receive a response from the Race Committee.

17. RISK STATEMENT

17.1) RRS 3 states: 'The responsibility for a boat's decision to participate in a race or to continue to race is hers alone.' By participating in this event each competitor agrees and acknowledges that sailing is a potentially dangerous activity with inherent risks. These risks include strong winds and rough seas, sudden changes in weather, failure of equipment, boat handling errors, poor seamanship by other boats, loss of balance on an unstable platform and fatigue resulting in increased risk of injury. Inherent in the sport of sailing is the risk of permanent, catastrophic injury or death by drowning, trauma, hypothermia or other causes.

18. INSURANCE

18.1) All boats shall have liability insurance currently in effect, covering yacht racing activities, property damage, personal injury, and death in an amount appropriate for the type of boat being sailed. A minimum coverage of \$500,000 per occurrence is required.







COURSE: The start line will be between Buoy 14 and the committee boat, which will be anchored south of Buoy 14 near the RCYC docks. The course and finish line will be determined by the Race Committee on the day of the race and announced on VHF 72 before the start sequence. The course commonly includes navigational buoys 2, 14, and 18. Race Committee will monitor VHF 72.

ELIGIBILITY AND INSTRUCTIONS: Races shall be governed by the rules as defined in the Racing Rules of Sailing, OCSA General Sailing Instructions and Courses, and supplemental sailing instructions posted on the OCSA Event Notice Board. SPECIAL INSTRUCTION: After starting, each boat shall, at a time and location of its choosing, but before reaching the three-boat length zone around the first mark, conduct a simulated crew overboard drill, by throwing an untethered Category IV flotation device (e.g., a throwable seat cushion, a detached ring buoy, or horseshoe buoy) a minimum 10 feet off the stern in a direction perpendicular to the transom, and then successfully recovering the device before proceeding. Between the first rounding mark and the second rounding mark or, if there is no second rounding mark, the finish line, each boat must repeat the simulated crew overboard drill, for a total of two crew overboard drills during the race. Exclusion: no boat shall initiate a simulated crew overboard drill within three boat lengths of the start line, finish line, another boat, or any mark of the course.



They wanted an event to put the Oregon racing community into "offshore" racing rivaling Seattle, BC, and California. The first race started at buoy "2" off the Columbia River and went 100 miles to buoy "Y" at Newport, Oregon. The response was enthusiastic. Jack and Richard took the leadership responsibility and CYC became the sponsor. During the first few years courses varied in direction and distance. In 1980, the present course of 193 miles was adopted.


THIS IS NOT A STRUCTURED CRUISE

CAUTION: Be aware of water depth when leaving the Main Channel of the river and know that there is a typical 5 to 7 foot tide change. Over time the river has moved the bottom sand and charted depths of the area are not always current, and some buoys have not been relocated to where they should be, or have been removed. We have learned the safe routes for transit with a 6 foot keel, after our surveys made during low tide with dingy and kayak.



COMMUNICATION: All boats shall carry a VHF radio capable of communicating on channels 16, 68, and 72.

PRIZES: Prizes will be given based on the number of entries in a class. Sailors are encouraged to come to PYC after racing to see results and receive awards.

INVITATION TO RACE

INVITATION: CYC invites all interested skippers and crew to participate in a "for fun" race series on the Columbia River between the I-5 and I-205 bridges. New sailors and racers are especially encouraged to join.

DESCRIPTION: This is a multiple week series with one race scheduled each Sunday (see exceptions below). This casual race series was started as an excuse for sailors to get out on the water through the winter months. The event has attracted a variety of racers and cruisers who all share a desire for sailing and light-hearted competition.

ELIGIBILITY AND INSTRUCTIONS: This series will be governed by the Racing Rules of Sailing and the OCSA General Sailing Instructions, except as modified by this notice. This event is open to all boats that comply with OCSA GSI 17 & 18. A boat must be registered to participate. All boats are welcome to race in the level fleet. The Race Captain may choose to include a PHRF fleet - boats racing in this fleet must be members of PHRF-NW.

DATES AND TIMES: Sundays, September 28, 2025 - March 8, 2026. There will be no races on Sundays, November 23, 30, December 21 and 28. The first start will be 1400 hours each Sunday during Daylight Savings Time (ending November 2), and then switch to 1300 thereafter for the remainder of the series. All fleets may be started together, or sequentially at the discretion of the Race Committee. The start sequence will be announced on VHF 72. A two (2) hour time limit shall be imposed for all fleets.

REGISTRATION AND FEES: Register online at www.sailpdx.org. Entry fee is \$50. All competitors are expected to volunteer as Race Committee one Sunday in the series. The committee boat receives first place the day they volunteer.


CLASS DIVISIONS: Boats may choose to sail the course unscored, race level, or race under PHRF handicap if so offered (as specified at the time of entry). **COURSES:** The start line will be between buoy 14 and the committee boat, which will be anchored south of 14 near the RCYC docks. The course and finish line will be determined by the Race Committee on the day of the race and announced on VHF 72 before the start sequence. The course commonly includes navigational buoys 2, 14, and 18. The Race Committee will monitor VHF 72.

HEARING REQUESTS: Competitors are encouraged to settle disputes in keeping with Corinthian spirit; hearing requests are emphatically discouraged but may be lodged if absolutely necessary following OCSA SI at www.sailpdx.org.


